History

- **February 1906** Takejiro Sugie founded Sugie Seitoujo, a specialized factory of rectangular half ceramic duct by private management.
- **April 1927** Devised a press molding method of rectangular half ceramic duct
- **March 1941** Improved the connection part of ceramic trough (utility model rights No. 296609 acquisition)
- **October 1948** Sugie Seitou Co.,Ltd. was established. The capital was ¥2,000,000. Goichi Sugie was appointed to the president.
- **December 1951** Devised a bolt-tightening ceramic perforated duct (utility model rights No. 388002 acquisition)
- **August 1961** The capital was increased to ¥20,000,000.
- **April 1962** New factory was established in Taketoyo-cho, and it started mass production of ceramic perforated duct with 120m tunnel kiln.
- **April 1970** Tokyo office new construction
- **October 1976** Yoneji Inoue was appointed to the president.
- **September 1983** Factory and office building has been added, the 120m tunnel kiln has been modified, and the production system of ceramic perforated duct has been established.
- **October 1985** Shoichiro Sugie was appointed to the president.
- **October 1986** 60m tunnel kiln especially for the exterior tiles was newly built.
- **July 1987** Merged the affiliated tile manufacturer Nippon Tile Block Manufacturing Co., Ltd., promoted the productivity enhancement of tile department, and the capital was increased to ¥31,530,000.
- **May 1988** Osaka office new construction
- **December 1988** Devised electromagnetic shielding protective duct for a buried cable (the utility model right level No. 985045 acquisition)
- **April 1990** Tokyo office and Osaka office has been promoted to branch.
- **August 1993** The capital was increased to ¥56,840,000.
- **October 1998** Resources circulation type recycled products "CERA-DUCT A" development (NETIS registration)
- **July 1999** 1st Construction Engineering Development Award · Encouragement Award
- **May 2000** ISO9001 Certification acquisition
